Resource and Financial Impacts

Impact to HFRS 1994

- Pre flooding:
- No involvement
- During flooding:
- Five week continuous attendance
- 10 appliances, 5 Landrovers,
 16 light portable pumps
- Green goddess appliances and support personnel/
- Estimated cost £309k

Impact to HFRS 2014

- Pre flooding:
- Hours invested in education and guidance
- During flooding:
- Attendance of stakeholder meetings
- Support and safety advice
- Youth education (school & pre school visits)
- Emergency response on three occasions (£6,000)



Impacts of flooding

2000/1 Flooding

- 10,000 sandbags (military aid)
- Cost to village £1.1 million
- Properties flooded 120 (60 above cellar level)
- Properties uninhabitable
 20
- Insurance claims £799,000
- Vacating homes £34,000

2013/14 Flooding

- 20,000 sandbags (community volunteers, ACSO's, council contractors)
- Properties flooded above cellar level - 17
- Properties uninhabitable 1
